How Beech House Surgery Uses Your Information To Provide You with Healthcare

This practice keeps medical records confidential and complies with the General Data Protection Regulation. We hold your medical record so that we can provide you with safe care and treatment. We will also use your information so that this practice can check and review the quality of the care we provide. This helps us to improve our services to you.

- We will share relevant information from your medical record with other health or social care staff or organisations when they provide you with care. For example, your GP will share information when they refer you to a specialist in a hospital or your GP will send details about your prescription to your chosen pharmacy.
- Below is a list of who we may share your information with organisations who are directly involved in your care, for example:
 - Community teams i.e. District Nurses, Midwives, Health Visitors, Community Advanced Nurse Practitioners, Scholl Nurses, Health promotion & chronic disease management teams, SPoA (Single Point of Access), Counsellors & Mental Health teams
 - Independent Contractors i.e. Dentists, Optician, Pharmacy Dispensing services.
 - o BCUHB/ NHS Trust i.e. Medicines Management, Ambulance Services
 - Social Services

 Voluntary Sector
 Private Sector

 Fire & Rescue services
 Police & Judicial Services
 - Research & Audit

- Healthcare staff working in A&E and Out of Hours care will also have access
 to your information. For example, it is important that staff who are treating you
 in an emergency know if you have any allergic reactions. This will involve the

Registering For NHS Care

- All patients who receive NHS care are registered on a national database.
- This database holds your name, address, date of birth and NHS Number but it does not hold information about the care you receive.
- The database is held by NHS Wales Information Services, a national organisation, which has legal responsibilities to collect NHS data. It is a secure haven for NHS Patient data.

<u>How Your Information Is Shared So That This Practice Can Meet Legal</u> Requirements

The law requires us to share information from your medical records in certain circumstances. Information is shared so that the NHS or Public Health England can, for example:

- · plan and manage services;
- · check that the care being provided is safe;
- · prevent infectious diseases from spreading.

We will share information with NHS Wales Information Services, the Care Inspectorate Wales and local health protection team (or Public Health Wales) when the law requires us to do so. We must also share your information if a court of law orders us to do so. Please see below for more information

North Wales Informatics Services

- North Wales Informatics Services is a national body which has legal responsibilities to collect information about health and social care services.
- It collects information from across the NHS Wales and provides reports on how the NHS is performing. These reports help to plan and improve services to patients.
- This practice must comply with the law and will send data to North Wales Informatics Services for example, when it is told to do so by the Secretary of State for Health or NHS Wales under the Health and Social Care Act 2012.

Public Health

Public health encompasses everything from national smoking and alcohol policies, the management of epidemics such as flu, the control of large-scale infections such as TB and Hepatitis B to local outbreaks of food poisoning or Measles. Certain illnesses are also notifiable; the doctors treating the patient are required by law to inform the Public Health Authorities, for instance Scarlet Fever.

This will necessarily mean the subjects personal and health information being shared with the Public Health organisations.

(Control of Patient Information) Regulations 2002

Identifying Patients Who Might Be At Risk Of Certain Diseases

- Your medical records will be searched by a computer programme so that we can identify patients who might be at high risk from certain diseases such as heart disease or unplanned admissions to hospital.
- This means we can offer patients additional care or support as early as possible.
- This process will involve linking information from your GP record with information from other health or social care services you have used.
- Information which identifies you will only be seen by this practice.

Safeguarding

- Sometimes we need to share information so that other people, including healthcare staff, children or others with safeguarding needs, are protected from risk of harm.
- These circumstances are rare.
- · We do not need your consent or agreement to do this.

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National Screening Programmes

- The NHS provides national screening programmes so that certain diseases can be detected at an early stage.
- These screening programmes include bowel cancer, breast cancer, cervical cancer, aortic aneurysms and a diabetic eye screening service.
- The law allows us to share your contact information with Public Health Wales so that you can be invited to the relevant screening programme. More information can be found at:

Checking The Quality Of Care - National Clinical Audits

- We contribute to national clinical audits so that healthcare can be checked and reviewed.
- Information from medical records can help doctors and other healthcare workers measure and check the quality of care which is provided to you.
- The results of the checks or audits can show where hospitals are doing well and where they need to improve.
- The results of the checks or audits are used to recommend improvements to patient care.
- Data are sent to NHS Wales Information Services a national body with legal responsibilities to collect data.
- The data will include information about you, such as your NHS Number and date of birth and information about your health which is recorded in coded form - for example the code for diabetes or high blood pressure.

- We will only share your information for national clinical audits or checking purposes when the law allows.
- You have the right to object to your identifiable information being shared for national clinical audits. Please contact the practice if you wish to object

Medical Research

We share information from medical records:

- to support medical research when the law allows us to do so, for example to learn more about why people get ill and what treatments might work best;
- we will also use your medical records to carry out research within the practice.

This is important because:

- the use of information from GP medical records is very useful in developing new treatments and medicines;
- medical researchers use information from medical records to help answer important questions about illnesses and disease so that improvements can be made to the care and treatment patients receive.

Officer Purpose of the processing	 To give direct health or social care to individual patients. Recipient or categories of recipients of the processed data	 The data will be shared with: healthcare professionals and staff in this surgery; local hospitals; out of hours services; diagnostic and treatment centres; or other organisations involved in the provision of direct care to individual patients.

Rights to object	 You have the right to object to information being shared between those who are providing you with direct care. This may affect the care you receive – please speak to the practice. You are not able to object to your name, address and other demographic information being sent to NHS Wales Information Services This is necessary if you wish to be registered to receive NHS care. You are not able to object when information is legitimately shared for safeguarding reasons. In appropriate circumstances it is a legal and professional requirement to share information for safeguarding reasons. This is to protect people from harm. Data we get from We receive information about your health from other organisations who are involved in providing you with health and social care. For example, if you go to hospital for treatment or an operation the hospital will send us a letter to let us know what happens. This means your GP medical record is kept upto-date when you receive care from other parts of the health service.

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
